## Redefining the Information Chain - New Ways and Voices

The ICCC (International Council for Computer Communications) in conjunction with IFIP (International Federation for Information Processing) is pleased to announce the **Third ICCC/IFIP Conference on Electronic Publishing** to be held in Ronneby, Sweden 10-12 May 1999. The title of this year's conference is **Electronic Publishing '99 - Redefining the Information Chain - New Ways and Voices**. The conference will be concerned with electronic publishing both for specialist audiences and for the general public. There will be two parallel tracks. The first track will include case studies, presentations of projects and presentations of implemented electronic publishing in public and scholarly libraries, publishers, museums, etc. It will also include electronic provision of local community or tourist information, government information, and the like. The second track will concentrate on technical issues such as file formats, retrieval issues, etc.

### Panel Debate

There will also be two Panel Debates that we hope will engage both speakers and delegates. The themes are: "Electronic Publishing year 2010 - a global perspective: What has happened and what will happen!?" and "Electronic Publishing in the service of democracy".

A major underlying theme of the ICCC/IFIP Electronic Publishing conferences is the promotion of an 'exchange of experience' between the participants - especially between academics researching in the area, and publishers and others with practical experience. All papers are refereed to ensure high quality.

The Conference is aimed at anyone involved in the production, provision or use of Electronic Publishing and/or its products, or the academic study of these activities.
